The First Turning of the Wheel of Dharma, also known as Chokhor Duchen, is a significant holiday during which we commemorate the day when the Buddha Shakyamuni first taught the four noble truths in Sarnath, India, and first turned the wheel of the dharma after attaining enlightenment.




Today, more than 300 nuns call Jangchub Choeling Nunnery their home. The nuns range in age from 7 to 80 years old. Most of the nuns are from Tibet and different parts of India, and there are nuns from many other parts of the world including Bhutan, Nepal, the United States, South Korea, Taiwan, France, Vietnam, and Singapore. Since the establishment of the nunnery in Mundgod, South India, Jangchub Choeling Nunnery has been an education center since 1987.



4. ANNUAL EXAMINATION 2024:-

The annual examination started on the 21st of August, The examination includes written tests, memorization challenges, and debates. Nuns from different classes such as **LOGIC** and **VINAYA** take part under the supervision of the nunnery's examination committee.

6. GRADUATION CEREMONY DAY OF VINAYA CLASS:-

Jangchub Choeling Nunnery offers 18 years of Buddhist studies courses focused on the five canonical texts following the Nalanda Tradition. After completing the eighteen years of studies, the nuns pursue an additional 4 years of Geluk examination studies to become a GESHEMA, followed by a year of Tantric course at Gyutoe Monastery in Dharamsala. Thankfully, we have successfully established facilities for Tantra classes within the nunnery for 3 years, allowing those who couldn't take the Geluk examination to learn about Tantra. We extend our congratulations to the nuns who graduated in 2024 after completing their 18 years of studies.

7. SUMMER RETREAT (YARNEY):-

Nuns of Jangchub Choelingare pleased to get the opportunity to participate in the virtuous activities of this year's annual 'Rainy Season Summer Retreat' (Yarney) which started from September 17th to October 2nd this year.

The summer retreat is a sacred tradition established by the Buddha. During this time, the nuns remain within the nunnery and concentrate exclusively on study and practice. Special vows are taken and strict discipline is followed by all of the Sangha. This is considered a very important and beneficial tradition, which offers the opportunity for lay people to participate by making offerings for the Sangha's food and tea.

This year our nunnery will be holding a new academic session called TSOKLANG. It starts on 20th September and ends after 8 days. Each day has two pairs in the morning and evening.

Collaboration between the Laity and Bhikkhunis to Prevent Wars: Overcoming the Challenges: 21 to 22/09/2024



Her biography:-

I have been a Tibetan Buddhist nun for 22 years. In 2002, I came from Tibet to pursue my calling as a nun and to study Buddha Dharma. Over the years, I have been fortunate to receive a comprehensive Dharma education and am now working towards my Geshema degree, which is equivalent to a PhD. In addition to my Dharma studies, I had the opportunity to learn modern science as a Tenzin Gyatso Science Scholar at Emory University, and in 2017 and 2022, I completed research internships at Northwestern University in U S A. I now serve as a science director at my nunnery, where I also engage in research projects.

As Tibetan nuns, we are fortunate to have these opportunities to study the Dharma, all thanks to the leadership and vision of His Holiness the 14th Dalai Lama. However, when we reflect on history, it becomes clear that this was not always the case. While Buddhism spread to Tibet in the late 6th century and there have been nuns since that time, there was no formal institution for nuns. As a result, it can be difficult to find substantial historical resources about nuns in Tibet.

Nevertheless, we should view the past as a lesson, using it to inspire positive change. We now have the chance to create a new era for the preservation of the Dharma and the well-being of future generations. To do so, modern education is essential, as it allows us to communicate effectively with the world and collaborate in meaningful ways.

1. The Importance of Collaboration :-) Her topic on that event:-

As humans, nuns, and students of the Buddha, we have a huge responsibility not only to free ourselves from suffering but also to help others do the same. More than 55% of the world's population are women, yet female monastics (nuns) are quite rare. This places an even greater responsibility on each nun to guide others, particularly women, on the path to happiness and inner peace, day by day, year by year. In today's chaotic world, many people are suffering unnecessarily due to misunderstandings and negative emotions. A large number do not know how to overcome these emotions. We have to teach them with compassion and share the dharma as a means of transformation. Here, "DHARMA" refers not merely to religious practice but to a method of transforming the mind from negativity to positivity.



2. CHALLENGES:-)

- Modern Education: In today's world, modern knowledge plays a vital role in effectively sharing wisdom. Unfortunately, many in the monastic community have not had access to extensive modern education, which can hinder the ability to connect with others.
- Communication Skills: Strong communication skills are crucial in our interconnected world. However, many of us do not prioritize developing these skills, making it harder to convey the dharma to a wider audience.
- Leadership Training: Good leadership is essential for serving communities effectively. While dharma is of course central, leadership training is often overlooked, yet it is necessary for guiding others.



3. Methods of Collaboration :-)

To address these challenges, all institutions need to place equal emphasis on both modern knowledge and dharma teachings. Leadership programs and communication skill development should be integrated into monastic education, ensuring that nuns are well-prepared to serve their communities. Dharma should be shared not only in religious contexts but also in academic and secular spaces, presented in a way that is accessible to all. By teaching the dharma in a secular manner, its wisdom can reach and benefit a broader audience, helping to cultivate peace and understanding in the world.

This holistic approach will empower nuns to collaborate more effectively with the laity and help prevent conflict, spreading compassion and wisdom to all.
